

Proclamation

Confederate States of America - History Month

WHEREAS: April is the month in which the Confederate States of America began and ended a four-

year conflict in the American Civil War; and

WHEREAS: Confederate Memorial Day on April 26th is a time when Georgians honor the more than

90,000 brave men and women who served the Confederate States of America; and

WHEREAS: Georgia joined the Confederacy in January 1861 when a convention ratified the ordinance

of secession; and

WHEREAS: Georgians have long cherished their Confederate history and the great leaders who made

sacrifices on her behalf; and

WHEREAS: One of the many Confederate soldiers who made a significant contribution to the state was

John Pemberton, who rose to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the Third Georgia Cavalry Battalion. After the war, Dr. Pemberton went on to develop what we know today as Coca-Cola, and his efforts aided significantly in the economic and cultural development of the

City of Atlanta, as well as the State of Georgia; and

WHEREAS: It is important that Georgians reflect upon our State's past and honor and respect the

devotion of her Confederate leaders, soldiers and citizens; and

WHEREAS: I, Anthony Emanuel, Mayor of the City of Trenton, Georgia do hereby proclaim April

2006 as Confederate States Of America - History Month in our City and encourage our citizens to learn about Georgia's heritage and history and to continue to expand our

individual level of tolerance.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the City of Trenton, Georgia to be affixed this third day of April in the year of our Lord two-thousand and six.

This story is about the Heroes of "Dixie" who are Commemorated during Confederate History and Heritage Month in April; proclamations are to be signed by Governors, Mayors and County Commissioners in their remembrance and honor.

The world famous Arlington National Cemetery is located in the shadow of the Curtis-Lee Mansion (Arlington House) that was home to General Robert E. Lee and family until 1861 at the beginning of the War Between the States. This cemetery is on the Virginia side of the Potomac River; Washington, D.C. is across the river.

Around the turn of the century 1900, this country also honored the men who fought for the Confederacy. This site of men who fought for "Dixie" is located in section 16. There is an inscription on the 32.5 foot high Confederate monument at Arlington National Cemetery that reads, "An Obedience To Duty As They Understood it; These Men Suffered All; Sacrificed All and Died!"

Some claim this Confederate Monument at Arlington may have been the first to honor Black Confederates. Carved on this monument is the depiction of a Black Confederate who is marching in step with the White soldiers. Also shown is a White Confederate who gives his child to a Black Woman for safe keeping.

In 1906, the United **Daughters** of the Confederacy asked permission from William Howard Taft to erect a monument. Taft was at the time serving as the United States Secretary of War and was in charge of National Cemeteries. With permission, the Arlington Confederate Memorial Association was formed and the ladies of the UDC were given authority to oversee work on the monument.

An agreement and contract was made with Sir Moses Ezekiel – a Jewish Confederate Veteran – the record of his service at the Battle of New Market while he was a Cadet at Virginia Military Institute. Work started at his workshop in Italy in 1910, and upon his death in 1917, the Great Sculptor was brought back home and buried near the base of the Arlington Confederate Monument. Sir Moses Ezekiel was honored in his life by being Knighted by the German and Italian Governments.

On June 4, 1914, the Arlington monument was unveiled to a crowd of thousands that included former Confederate and Union soldiers. The Memorial Event was presided over by President Woodrow Wilson and the people applauded the stirring speeches given by: General Bennett H. Young, Commander In Chief of the United Confederate Veterans; General Washington Gardner, Commander In Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic and Colonel Robert E. Lee, grandson of General Lee.

The Confederate monument unveiling was concluded by a 21-gun salute and the Arlington monument was officially given to the United Daughters of the Confederacy and was given back to the U.S. War Department for keeping and accepted by President Woodrow Wilson who said: "I am not so happy as **PROUD** to participate in this capacity on such an occasion, Proud that I represent such a people."

Since Woodrow Wilson, wreaths have been sent to both sections of Arlington, including the Confederate section, to honor those who died for freedom. Some Presidents have also spoken at Arlington on Confederate Memorial Day.

The Chaplain's Corner

It was good to see the many members of the camp who turned out to participate in the "Siege of Bridgeport".Both days were cold, but there was a good turnout by our reenactors and by the spectators. The cool weather was appreciated in the afternoon when the "Battle" was going on.

This month we will observe "Confederate Memorial Day". Our camp plans to observe this day on April 27th at the Veteran's park at Trenton and on April 30th at the

Georgia Monument at the Chickamauga Battlefield. I have done some research to see how the first Georgia Confederate Memorial Day got startedand this is what I found.

In 1874, the Georgia General Assembly approved legislation adding as a new public Holiday – The 26th day of April in each year – commonly known as Memorial Day". April 26th marks the anniversary of the end of "The War Between the States" in Georgia, for it was on this day in 1865 that Confederate General Joseph E. Johnston's surrender to General William Sherman in North Carolina became official. Johnston had been in charge of Georgia's defense, so this day marked the end of the War for Georgia. Exactly when Georgians began commemorating April 26th as Memorial Day is unclear, but the language of the 1874 act recognizes that April 26th was already being celebrated as an unofficial holiday. The day of observance may trace to the women of Columbus, Georgia who on April 23rd 1866,organized a memorial association and began a campaign to have a special day for "Paying honor to those who died defending the life, honor and happiness of the Southern women." Three days later, the Atlanta Ladies Memorial Association was organized and on April 26th 1866, the association held a Confederate Memorial observance at Oakland Cemetery.
